

VINTAGE ROADSIDE HIGHLIGHTS THE HISTORY OF ROUTE 66 WITH THE RELEASE OF ZIA LODGE T-SHIRT

Once located in Albuquerque, New Mexico along an 18-mile stretch of Route 66 also known as Central Avenue, the Zia Lodge offered visitors every new comfort of the day. With the memory of primitive auto camps still fresh in many travelers' minds, guests were enticed to stay and enjoy "safe steam heat, tiled baths, electric refrigeration" and "furnishings of finest quality." Perhaps most charming of all, each guest had access to their own private garage – both car and traveler could tuck safely in for the night after a dusty day on the road.

Here's what one couple had to say about their time at the Zia Lodge:

"Dear Folks,

Boy do they have swanky overnight places here - reasonable. The only trouble is, it's so far from good old New England.

Everett & Hazel Albuquerque, New Mexico. July 30th, 1941"

Serving as a welcome overnight stop for decades, the Zia Lodge began its decline in the early 1960s after the completion of I-40 routed travelers around Route 66's historic path through the heart of Albuquerque. As tourist traffic faded, so did the Zia Lodge.

Ultimately lost to fire in 2004, the Zia Lodge remains one of the most widely remembered motor courts along Route 66. With its Pueblo Revival architecture, charming garages, courteous service, iconic sign and claim to be "the last word in motor lodge comfort and convenience," Zia Lodge was the type of resting place travelers still hope to find at the end of a long day on the road.
