

Author Robby Dixon describes a concept he calls a 'conscious' home environment as a valuable contributor to helping parents practice 'prison-preventing' parenthood. "Imprisonment really begins long before the iron doors slam behind a person. Incarceration's start is three-leveled -- spiritual, mental and physical. It virtually ensures that children with 'imprisoned' minds and spirits will eventually end up behind bars," he comments.

Reclaiming Our Children centers on time-tested, insightful 'prescriptions' to help parents and children avoid the traps that lead to crime. Dixon argues that not only is this behavior preventable, but through the power of God, positive images, perception and desire, even the recidivism rate can be decreased. "Study and hear, so that you are able to raise your children the right way. It exudes from God," Dixon stresses. "We often try to delete God from various aspects of our lives. Yet we always find that God, being God, is everything in one aspect and the essence of anything in the other aspect."



BOOK EXCERPT



ell into the twenty-first century, it's clear that we haven't yet solved all of our problems as a nation. Crime is a major issue well beyond epidemic proportions in our society. Deviant behavior among our children has increased dramatically: Children are murdering each other at school; children are murdering their parents and committing suicide in record numbers. I submit to you that we're on the verge of losing the vast majority of this generation's youth. Sadly, we're crushing our children's dreams and goals, opening the door for them to be seduced away by glorified criminal elements. Another equally saddening reality is this: Along with increases in crime come growing rates of incarceration.

Yet to the surprise of many, I hold that not everyone who commits a crime is a criminal. Yes, it's true: Many of our nation's children have erred in judgment that does not however make them criminals. Criminals consciously commit crimes with narrow goals in mind: power


and/or financial gain. Other, non-criminal persons commit crimes because they are influenced or deceived into doing so. Yet our prison systems are full of these types of men and women who have merely made mistakes, errors in judgment.

Twenty-three years ago I was one such person, 22 years of age, very kind-hearted, impressionable, naïve to the trappings of the world. In 1985, the year that would change my life for years to come, I was duped into committing a crime, and before I knew it my life had begun to change forever. Having landed the in the Federal Corrections System, it would be almost 11 years later before I'd have another opportunity to resume ordinary life and be together again with my family. But that very time wrought many newfound experiences upon my then-young, impressionable mind. Many of these experiences would later serve as scars that would remain to serve as reminders to me of deeply imbedded emotional wounds.

I was raised in northern California, the son of a gifted minister and a devout Christian mother. One would think this environment should have contained all the makings for well-reared children whose subsequent lives would remain unblemished. However this was not the case with me, for as gifted and talented a minister though my father was, and though he could preach a sermon that would stir the soul of the strongest atheist and bring folks to tears, as I witnessed on many occasions as a youth, he wasn't rightfully prepared for the responsibilities of fatherhood. I felt closest to him as a youth; I was his first-born son and everyone around me knew it. I was raised in a stable home, and looking back I realized my parents did the best job of rearing us they knew how at that time. It wasn't until I was much older and had been incarcerated for a few years that I'd realize how much preparation for life I hadn't received.

I came to understand that despite growing up with both parents at home,

I'd never developed a truly personal and meaningful relationship with my father. To this day, I know very little of my father's childhood, teen-age or young adulthood; he never shared his childhood stories with me. It seemed to me the older he became, the more distant he grew and the more disconnected from involved fatherhood. Being raised in "Mr. Roger's Neighborhood" stained me with a sort of naiveté about life beyond the bubble I knew. As a child I had no clue how ugly people could be and as a teenager, looking back, I was a bit too trusting. This would later be my downfall that would lead to my physical hiatus. And even though I loved my father very much and do hold some very fond memories of my childhood, I vowed to be a different kind of father to my son, and the best father God would allow me to be. My son will know every aspect of his father's life, his lineage and how much he's truly loved. It's very important to me that my son grows up with no emotional baggage or scars. He'll know what to expect from life and people, yet he'll hold the dearest memories of his life's experiences as far back as he can recall. He'll be raised a very balanced young man to the very best of his mother's and


As a skilled author, lecturer and social critic, Dixon has participated in a variety of forums, including workshops, seminars and youth conferences throughout the Northern California

A Visionary/Practical R/X for Imprisonment Prevention... and More

In his indispensable new book, *Reclaiming Our Children*, much-honored author/lecturer/social critic Robby Dixon asks crucial questions – and offers penetrating answers and prescriptions – few before him have even thought to ask, about imprisonment (and our prison systems) in America, sociopsychological-spiritual dynamics that have led so many of our youth to incarceration... and most importantly, how parents can proactively inoculate children against the forces that lead to imprisonment and contribute to the genesis of a national shift away from mass soul-and-actual confinement, to a new, spreading paradigm of material productivity and spiritual liberty.

From extensive research and personal experience counseling families and prison inmates and exploration of prison systems and environments, Dixon presents shocking evidence that for certain special interests prison serves as a sinister profit-generator that (wittingly or unwittingly) actually conditions inmates into "revolving doors" returning them to prisons again and again.

Where does imprisonment really begin? Dixon then asks. Long before the iron doors slam behind a person, Dixon avers. In fact, he says, incarceration's start is three-leveled – and begins in the mind and heart in ways that if not prevented virtually ensure that a child with an "imprisoned" mind and spirit will eventually end up behind bars. Such spiritual incarceration begins as a child's

Dixon clearly identifies these and gives parents incisive guidance about how to deal with them and replace their harm by teaching children the vital significance of the most priceless image of all: the image of God in which human personhood is made. Only from such understanding, Dixon persuasively argues, will a child develop an accurate and spirit-mind-saving sense of true self-worth.


What can help parents practice prison-preventing parenthood? Dixon describes and analyzes a unique concept he calls a "conscious" home environment, as a valuable contribution to planning and strategy for day-to-day parenting. Practical applications he draws will enable countless parents, to ensure freedom, delight and mental and spiritual health for their children.

What – if anything – can be done to heal our broken prison and cultural ethos? I believe *Reclaiming Our Children* possesses potential impact far beyond its essential uses as a parental "tool kit" for raising un-jailed children. Educators and criminal justice authorities will find much in this book that rebukes the systems that have increasingly shackled America's children and young adults – but also down-to-earth visionary suggestions Dixon gives for reform, restructuring and re-founding harmful societal systems that have not just lost their effectiveness, but also their very functions to protect society and prepare future generations to nourish it.

Dixon writes unabashedly from a Judeo-Christian perspective (while not denigrating the value of other spiritual "ways"), reasoning that if knowledge of the importance of one's being made in the image of God is central to spiritual and personal growth, it makes little sense to excise all reference to and reliance on God from America's social fabric. He concludes this landmark work by laying out a powerful, comprehensive, God-based vision for replacement of outworn cultural and sociological expressions, institutions and practices with humankind-nation-nourishing mass and individual thought and action that will amount to nothing less than national "repentance" and renewal.

Controversial I can certainly predict Dixon's work will be; he writes boldly, with a frankness, sureness and authority of manner some readers may resent. Yet open minds will, I believe, see past any initial "bristling" *Reclaiming Our Children* may provoke, to learn from a hard-forged wisdom that can, if heeded, change the way Americans live, love, parent, create, discipline, find joy and build our future.


