These thought leaders will discuss strategies for improving competencies across the spectrum in nursing education.

Dr. Beverly Malone, NLN CEO, delivers her always anticipated Summit address on Friday morning followed by the COE, research award, and scholarship presentations. The National Faculty Meeting conducted by President-elect Dr. Cathleen Shultz, in conjunction with the Nurse Educator Workforce Development Advisory Council, follows. The Annual Business Meeting, including the inaugural President's Address and the Laerdal-funded Debra L. Spunt Lecture, take place on Saturday morning. The Summit finale occurs on Saturday evening with the President's Reception followed by the annual celebratory banquet featuring the NLN Awards and the induction ceremony of the 2009 Academy of Nursing Education fellows.



Contact hours/CEUs will be awarded for the keynote address, the plenary sessions, the Debra L. Spunt Lecture, the seven concurrent sessions, and the poster presentations. 
Preparing Students to Function within a Regulated Health Care Environment

As the health care regulatory environment continues to change, agencies are struggling to keep up with new requirements. When faculty bring a group of students to a clinical agency, they often find that these new regulations impact on expectations of students while they are affiliating at the agency. This session, led by NLN board member and NNSDO treasurer Julia Aucoin, will provide information about several new reporting requirements from major federal and other regulatory bodies: the Joint Commission National Patient Safety Goals, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services Core Measures, Never Events, Health Care Acquisition Performance System (HCAPS) reporting, and other quality requirements.


