Glenwood Caverns Adventure Park Adds New Attractions

Glenwood Caverns Adventure Park added five new experiences as part of its 10th anniversary celebration in 2009.

- 1. A 4D theater, the only one in Colorado, offers state-of-the-art entertainment with special effects that make viewers feel like part of the show.
- 2. A new Laser Tag Arena allows players to experience a modern version of an old-west shoot-out.
- 3. The Speleobox Cave Simulator, contains 200 feet of gyrating "cave passages" to explore.
- 4. The Giddy Up! is an amusement ride that lifts up to seven riders into the air, and then lowers them back down to the ground in a bouncing motion that creates a negative G-force, providing a thrilling ride every time.
- 5. The Mine Shaft Shootin' Gallery is an electronic shooting gallery with animated, Western-themed targets that test each shooter's skills and concentration.

These new additions complement old favorites including Colorado's only alpine coaster, a giant swing that launches riders out over Glenwood Canyon, gemstone sluice box mining, rock wall climbing and a fort-style maze. Of course, at the heart of all this fun are the Glenwood Caverns themselves, a protected natural treasure. A variety of tours offer visitors several ways to enjoy the underground views and spectacular cave formations. However silly, the cast is polished and includes professionally trained actors who have performed in New York City and Los Angeles. 

A Proliferation of Public Art In Downtown Glenwood Springs

Seven new sculptures have been added to a growing collection of artwork in downtown Glenwood Springs. Visitors will notice an eclectic variety of sculptures that include such varied pieces as a giant man made of metal at 9th and Grand, a sphere accented with a chunk of blue glass at Centennial Park, and a multi-colored disk surrounded by bronze at the base of the steps to the pedestrian bridge on Grand Avenue. These and four other sculptures are the latest additions to an assortment of public art installations made possible by a grant to the Glenwood Springs Center for the Arts and the Glenwood Springs Chamber Resort Association, which jointly created the 2 Rivers Art Project Committee. In the project, artists' work is selected and displayed for one year, after which one piece is purchased by the city to become a permanent downtown fixture. Other pieces are returned to the artists. 2009 marked the second year for the project. The artwork from 2008 was such a delight that the committee asked artists if it could remain for public display for an additional year. All agreed and in 2009 Glenwood Springs was fortunate to have a double-dose of artwork for all to enjoy. Permanent pieces to the collection include the bronze beaver near the Hotel Colorado and the larger than life daisies along Seventh Street. gwarts@rof.net

Glenwood Whitewater Park

The first of its kind on the Colorado River, the new Glenwood Whitewater Park is making a huge splash in the national kayaking community. The \$1.4 million whitewater park is designed for the varying levels of river flow that occur naturally throughout the year. A "standing wave" occurs during low, medium and high river flows, due to artificial boulders located at different places in the park. Newly opened in 2008, Glenwood Whitewater Park successfully hosted the 2009 Freestyle Kayaking U.S. Team Trials which led to the 2009 World Championships in Switzerland. glenwoodwhitewaterevents.com

Rio Grande Recreation Trail

A Rails-to-Trails type project, the Rio Grande Trail is built in the historic Denver and Rio Grande Western Railroad (D&RGW) right-of-way corridor. The Rio Grande Trail passes through Glenwood Springs, Carbondale, Basalt, Woody Creek and Aspen, following the Roaring Fork River and Highway 82 in some sections. The 4.4-mile recreation trail between Glenwood Springs and Aspen was recently honored with the Outstanding Community Tourism Initiative Award at the Governor's 2008 Colorado Tourism Conference. It is a relatively flat trail with some rolling hills and a 2 percent grade from Glenwood Springs to Aspen. The path is paved for 33 miles from Glenwood Springs to Woody Creek; it is a soft-surface dirt trail for 11 miles from Woody Creek to Aspen. rfta.com/trails.html

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



Operation Vacation - Providing Soldiers With All-Expense-Paid Vacations

Military personnel and their families are enjoying all-expense-paid vacations to Glenwood Springs, Colorado thanks to a program called "Operation Vacation". Operation Vacation is a non-profit, all-volunteer organization established in August 2005 based in Glenwood Springs whose purpose is to reunite deserving soldiers with their families on free vacations to Glenwood Springs.


Founder Bob Johnson created the Operation Vacation concept because he wanted to do something for soldiers away from their kids. Johnson arranges three-day weekend getaways for soldiers on leave or who have completed tours of duty in Iraq and Afghanistan. Johnson explains, "Local Glenwood Springs businesses have stepped forward to provide complimentary lodging, meals, activities, and transportation each month for the soldiers and their families." As a result, the community has treated over two dozen military families to holidays worth \$3500 each.

Johnson works through Fort Carson, an Army base near Colorado Springs, which selects eligible soldiers. Their Glenwood Springs getaways have included skiing at Sunlight Mountain Resort, swimming in the Glenwood Hot Springs Pool, visits to Glenwood Caverns Adventure Park, snowmobiling, paragliding, rafting, fly fishing, massages and airplane tours.

In recognition for his efforts, Johnson was presented the Army's Certificate of Appreciation for Patriotic Civil Service. Operation Vacation has received notable media attention, featured in magazines and on television programs such as: Today Show, People Magazine, Fox & Friends on FOX Cable News Network, CBS Radio Network, Denver CBS 4, Denver NBC 9 News -9 Who Care Award, and Grand Junction KJCT 8. operationvacation.org.



Soak It All In: Earth

Explore the lay of the land in and around Glenwood Springs by hiking, biking, caving, riding, or golfing. There's plenty to experience in Glenwood Springs on terra firma.

Hiking

Flowering meadows, alpine forests, a variety of wildlife and views clear to tomorrow characterize the hiking experience around Glenwood Springs. Warm up with a stroll along in Glenwood Canyon. For a heartier dose of exercise, try Hanging Lake, Storm King Memorial Trail, Red Mountain and Lookout Mountain. The Glenwood Canyon hiking and biking trail meanders for 16 miles along the Colorado River and Interstate 70. It's a great way to view the natural beauty of the sheer limestone walls and catch the river rafters and kayakers tumbling along the river's whitewater.

Biking

The best way to get the lay of the land in Glenwood Springs is by bike. Glenwood Springs has mountain biking trails for any ability, from paved paths and country dirt roads, to rugged double- and single-track trails. Warm up with a leisurely ride through Glenwood Canyon, a scenic, 16-mile paved trail that hugs the Colorado River from Glenwood Springs to Dotsero. The 44-mile Rio Grande Trail goes all the way to Aspen. Choose from over 70 miles of trails. Use your own equipment or rent from one of several local sport shops and outfitters.

Glenwood Caverns Adventure Park

Located on top of Iron Mountain, Glenwood Caverns Adventure Park offers guests a full day of fun and adventure. Water is central to Glenwood Springs, and with two rivers, it is arguably the defining geography. Named after bubbling mineral hot springs, the town was built at the confluence of the mighty Colorado River and the Gold Medal fishing waters of the Roaring Fork River.

Glenwood Hot Springs Pool

Glenwood Hot Springs Pool, established in 1888, is the largest mineral hot springs pool in the world, measuring over two blocks long. The thermal waters are 90° - 93° F (32° - 34° C) in the large pool and 104° F (40° C) in the smaller, therapy pool. Features like two water slides, inner tubes, diving boards, and bubble chairs bring out the kid in everyone. Visitors have access to modern locker room facilities, lounge chairs, towel service, and swim suit rentals. Other amenities include the new Spa of the Rockies, a 107-room Lodge, the health-based Athletic Club, a retail Sport Shop, the poolside Grill, and a challenging miniature golf course. 970-947-2955, 800-537-SWIM (7946), hotspringspool.com

Whitewater Rafting

The Colorado River flows through Glenwood Springs and has long attracted ambitious river runners attempting to tame its fiercest sections. Today, a host of commercial rafting companies guide thousands of visitors annually down the Colorado and Roaring Fork Rivers through rapids with names like Upper Superstition and Tombstone, substantiating Glenwood Springs' stature as one of the country's premier whitewater destinations. Calmer waterways, such as South Canyon Rapids, are suitable for families with children as young as four. There are several local rafting companies that offer fully guided trips.

Kayaking

The stretch of Colorado River through Glenwood Canyon is one of the finest in the state with Class III and IV, heart-pounding rapids, as well as calmer stretches with breath-taking scenery. A true test of paddling skills is at the new Glenwood Whitewater Park. For those who want to explore the river on their own and play in the waves, bring or rent a kayak locally.

Fly-fishing

Field & Stream Magazine named Glenwood Springs as #1 in their America's Top 20 Fishing Towns list. Some people consider fly-fishing a passion, even a spiritual experience. Whatever your level of interest, the area's Gold Medal waters harbor an astonishing number of brookies, browns, cutthroats and rainbow trout. Enlist the help of a local guide to direct you to some of the best fly-fishing in the state.

Aquatic Center at the Glenwood Springs Community Center

An innovative Aquatic Center at the Glenwood Springs Community Center features a "zero depth" pool (o" to 3' 6" deep) with a gradual beach-like entry for easy access, fun attractions that spray and splash, and a wacky water slide. Skiing and Riding

At, 9895 feet above sea level, Sunlight Mountain Resort has 67 trails covering over 470 acres of terrain and a vertical drop of over 2,000 feet for skiers and snowboarders of all abilities. The diversity of terrain features everything from cruisers to heart-stopping steeps all at family-friendly prices. Sunlight Mountain's Extreme challenges all experts. With a pitch of 52 percent, the Heathen is one of the steepest trails in the state. At Tri County Point, riders can see three different counties; Garfield, Mesa, and Pitkin. The highlight of the tour is a visit to Baylor Park, where guests can ride without guides through a huge undulating meadow. The scenery includes breathtaking views of Mt. Sopris, West Elk Mountains and Flattops. Guided tours include helmets, insulated bibs, boots and gloves, and machines are equipped with electric hand warmers. Half-day tours wind 30 miles through the White River National Forest.

Cross-Country Skiing and Snowshoeing

The cross-country center offers 29 kilometers of groomed cross-country and snowshoe trails. Beginner, intermediate and advanced trails wind their way through a gorgeous alpine valley, flanked by Sunlight Mountain and the 10,300-foot Williams Peak. Cross-country and snowshoe rentals are available at the Sunlight Mountain Ski and Bike shop in Glenwood Springs, as well as on the mountain. There is no charge for trail use.

Underground vapor caves, lakes suspended on mountainsides, engineering marvels, and amazing wildlife make Glenwood Springs one-of-a-kind.

Caverns

The Glenwood Caverns Adventure Park cave tours offer visitors a rare glimpse into a primeval underground world formed millions of years ago. Visitors view majestic stalagmites, stalactites and unusual crystalline formations still alive and growing. Inside the Barn, a soaring five-story room decorated with unusual crystalline formations, see delicate soda straws, and strange cave bacon formations and look into the inspiring King's Row, a massive underground open area with hundreds of glittering cave formations. 970-945-4228, 800-530-1635, glenwoodcaverns.com

Yampah Vapor Caves

The Yampah Vapor Caves are said to purify body and spirit as they soothe away aches and pains. They are the only known natural vapor caves in North America, in which hot mineral waters flow through the cave floors at 125 degrees to create a natural geothermal steam bath. 970-945-0667, yampahspa.com

Hanging Lake

This scenic trail is approximately one mile long and, in some places, an extremely steep climb. The reward at the top is worth the strenuous exercise. Hanging Lake is in an idyllic setting which is peaceful and serene. Continue on the trail to Spouting Rock for another spectacular work of nature.

Glenwood Canyon

Glenwood Canyon was formed by the waters of the Colorado River, previously known as the Grand River, carving its way through the granite of the Rocky Mountains. The canyon is approximately 16 miles long with sheer, steep cliffs rising on either side of the river.

In 1980, work began to widen the interstate highway through Glenwood Canyon. Engineers used 30,000 tons of steel and 810,000 tons of concrete to build the 12-mile highway, with 40 bridges and elevated sections of highway, as well as three tunnels. Completed in 1992, the final cost was approximately \$4.90 million. It became a project utilizing never-before-used construction methods known as balanced cantilevered construction, and it is recognized as one of the great engineering achievements of the U.S.

Wildlife Viewing

Glenwood Canyon is home to a herd of Rocky Mountain bighorn sheep. They can often be seen from the hiking and biking path, especially near the No Name Tunnels just west of Glenwood Springs. If you go out looking, bring binoculars and scan the hillsides on the north side of the canyon. If you're lucky, you'll catch a glimpse of these sure-footed creatures.

Big Game Hunting

The Glenwood Springs area is known for its world-class herds of deer and elk which draw hunters from all over the country in the fall. Hunting seasons range from archery and muzzle-loading in September to the combined elk and deer seasons in October and November.



Meeting Places

With historic, picturesque charm, beautiful mountain location and scenery, Glenwood Springs offers a multitude of options when it comes to providing meeting facilities offering everything from beautiful ranch retreats to large riverside parks to historic hotel ballrooms.

Several of the local hotels accommodate meetings or small get-togethers. The holidays are especially popular for office or group parties.

The Glenwood Springs Community Center, has space for up to 350 people. Corporate event planners have praised the center for its opportunities for team-building programs, such as the indoor climbing wall and outdoor ice skating rink. The center also features a comfortable lounge with computers and free Internet access for meeting attendees to check e-mail during meeting breaks.

A moderate alpine climate usually allows use of outdoor venues from late April to late September. The town's outdoor parks on the Colorado and Roaring Fork rivers are perfect spots for hosting large family gatherings or barbecues.

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

History of this Resort Town

UTE INDIANS

The nomadic Ute Indians were the first people to call Glenwood Springs home. In addition to prime hunting and fishing grounds, the Utes believed in the healing powers of the hot mineral springs. They referred to them as "Yampah," roughly translated as "big medicine". For them, the springs were not only a source of physical regeneration, but provided mental and spiritual nourishment. Indians and their horses soaked in the hot water pools and underground vapor caves to strengthen their spirits and resolve.

WHITE SETTLERS

In 1860, Captain Richard Sopris was the first white man to experience the hot springs in what later would be called Glenwood Springs. It wasn't long before the valley, punctuated with more than 50 hot springs, became a favorite spot for many weary miners, as well as entrepreneurs dreaming of world-class resorts and big profits. Walter Devereaux, along with his two brothers, set out to build the world's largest hot springs pool.

By 1883, the confluence of the Roaring Fork and the Colorado rivers had been given the name Defiance. It was a rough-hewn town of bars and brothels, populated with gamblers, gunslingers, miners and madams. The town retained its rebellious moniker until 1885, when it was changed to Glenwood Springs by Mrs. Sarah Cooper, wife of one of the founding fathers, Isaac Cooper.

FAIRY CAVES

The Fairy Caves (now called Glenwood Caverns Adventure Park) were the first real tourist attraction in Glenwood Springs, opening to the public in 1886. Fifty cents would gain you access to the subterranean caverns, grottos and labyrinth corridors, adorned with the most beautiful calcareous formations of stalactites, stalagmites and pillars.

HOT SPRINGS POOL and HOTEL COLORADO

The Hot Springs Pool was completed in lavish Victorian style in 1888. The grand peachblow sandstone bathhouse was equipped with all the accourrements of the time, including private porcelain bathtubs and an exclusive casino that attracted a highbrow clientele. Soon after, the elegant Hotel Colorado opened its doors in 1893. At an extravagant cost of \$850,000, the hotel was modeled after the sixteenth century Italian Renaissance Villa de Medici Castle.

Dubbed "Spa In the Rockies", Glenwood Springs attracted the rich and famous of the day. The prestigious guest list included President Theodore Roosevelt, Baby Doe Tabor, President William Taft, the "Unsinkable" Molly Brown, and gangster Al Capone.

DOC HOLLIDAY

One of Glenwood Springs' most infamous citizens appeared on the scene around this same time. Doc Holliday, gunman-gambler-dentist, headed west after the famous shootout at the OK Corral, where he hoped that soaking in the hot springs would cure his advanced tuberculosis. But the mineral-rich waters could not dissipate the ravages of the disease. Doc Holliday died at the Glenwood Hotel in November 1887. His memorial in Linwood Cemetery remains a popular attraction today.
