

FACTS AT A GLANCE

Located in Takoma Park, MD, Don Bosco Cristo Rey High School provides a rigorous, college preparatory curriculum to students in the greater Washington area who have very limited financial resources but dream of going to college. All students participate in the Corporate Work Study Program, where they gain professional work experience and earn money to pay for a portion of their education.



Our School and Students

- 280 high school students
- 73% of students qualify for free or reduced price lunch programs
- 39% reside in the District of Columbia, 45% in Prince Georges County, 15% in Montgomery County, and 1% in Anne Arundel County
- For the current school year, the median annual family income for DBCR families is less than \$35,000.

Why is Don Bosco Cristo Rey High School Needed in Our Area?

- 33% of District children live in poverty. For 2009, the Federal Poverty Level is \$22,050 for a family of four.
- More than 40% of youth in the District do NOT complete high school.
- In 2007 testing, 66% of D.C. eighth grade students scored <u>below</u> basic proficiency levels in Math and 52% in Reading.

Corporate Work Study Program – "The School that Works"

A key part of the educational experience at Don Bosco Cristo Rey High School is the Corporate Work Study Program (CWSP). All students work one full day a week, plus a rotating Monday, at sponsoring companies in order to gain real—world workplace experience. Students learn valuable professional skills while extending classroom learning in an unusual way.

- Teams of four students share a single entry level office position on a rotating basis.
- CWSP staff secures the jobs and trains the student workers
- Students are transported to and from work with supervision from CWSP staff.
- Each student earns a portion of the cost of his or her education through the CWSP.

Renovations and Expansion

Don Bosco Cristo Rey co-owners, the Archdiocese of Washington and the Salesians of Don Bosco, along with the Cristo Rey Network® each contributed \$1 million in seed funding to bring Don Bosco Cristo Rey High School to the greater Washington, DC area. Additional "Cornerstone Founders" made up of area philanthropists, corporations, and foundations continue to make significant investments to cover start-up costs and establish Don Bosco Cristo Rey on solid financial footing.

- DBCR will grow from an initial group of 125 students to full capacity of 450 -500 students.
- As the student body grows, DBCR will expand its building footprint by adding more classrooms and science labs, a library and technology center, administrative offices, and a guidancecollege counseling center.



The Cristo Rey Network®

- Cristo Rey is a national association of Catholic high schools that features a college preparatory curriculum tailored to the students' needs.
- The first Cristo Rey high school opened in Chicago in 1996.
- There are 24 existing Cristo Rey schools throughout the country serving over 5,000 bright, highly-motivated high school students.
- 99% of 2008 graduates of Cristo Rey Network® schools were accepted into college.
- B.J. and Bebe Cassin were the first philanthropists to promote the scaling up of the Cristo Rey Model with a \$12 million commitment in 2001. Today, dozens of foundations, including the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, and individual donors throughout the country have contributed to the efforts of the Cristo Rey Network® and to individual schools.
