



Free Energy Audits a Huge Success!

If you income qualify (see below), call for free audit at 651.221.4462, e. 136.

The RHRA recently completed a successful run of free energy audits, bringing energy experts to 83 Roseville households for consultation.



Conducted by the Neighborhood Energy Connection (NEC), the audits provided a unique opportunity for the residents to have their homes evaluated, assessing their structures and elements—to improve home's energy efficiency. "While households

with incomes of \$21,695 to \$41,722 (family of 1 to 4) normally qualify for a free audit through NEC, this program extended free audits to the first 83 homeowners who didn't meet these income guidelines," said Jeanne Kelsey, RHRA's Housing Program Coordinator. "We were pleased to see the free audits garnered up so quickly. Stay tuned for more free audits next year."
