David Nicosia Longhi

The 27-year-old native of Copenhagen Denmark is the author of the controversial new book "When Women Cheat." First published in May 2010, his book is now the #2 bestseller in Denmark.

Q: Why did you write a book about female infidelity?

A: I was inspired to write about this subject, when I became single after a long-term relationship. I met a lot of women and I began to see sides of modern women that I hadn't given much thought to before. Their cynical view on love, sex and loyalty both frightened and fascinated me. Besides this, I also think female infidelity is much more interesting to look at, because its still more taboo than male infidelity.



Q: The way the book is written is very direct and hard. Did you write this book because you experienced infidelity?

A: No, I was in a long-term relationship for five years and as far as I know, there wasn't any cheating from her side, but there were from mine. This is also described in the book.

Q: What is your message with this book?

A: I want to challenge how people perceive fidelity and love. Our love ideals are changing fast. Men and women are being alienated from one other. Monogamy, romance and trust is something that only exists in Hollywood and those who choose to chase these ideals often wake up to the harsh reality. In my point of view, female infidelity is much more dangerous than male infidelity. This statement does provoke a lot of people and I know that, but when you take the information and evidence in my book into consideration, you will hopefully have a new look at it. The humiliation associated with infidelity is a form of mental castration for men. The downside of our "free nation" is that it is a breeding ground for jealousy, anger and violence.

Q: Did you write this book because you had bad experiences with women? And what have the reactions from women and men been along with feminists?

A: I got this question a lot, from both the Danish media as well as feminists. They would all like to think so, but in actuality, I get along very well with women and vice versa. The only women I don't get along with are declared feminists and men who are feminists as well. There is only one thing

more depressing than having a discussion with a feminist and that is planning your own suicide. Honestly speaking, we live in the freest part of the world and they still seem to find something to fight about and their antipathy towards men is repulsive. I see absolutely no difference in plain old racism and modern gender-patriotism. Here you just replace skin color with gender instead.

The book itself received a lot of positive feedback from readers, both confident women as well as men who could relate to a lot of the issues. The sales were good and so were the reviews, aside from some no-contest hate reviews from feminist websites. However the book is written with all good intent, so if you have an open mind, you will be entertained and get food for thought.

Q: When the book was published in Denmark, you decided to donate a portion of the sales to the National Cancer Association and specifically donate it towards research in testicular cancer. Why did you decide to do that?

A: Even though my donation is a mere drop in the ocean, my point was to show that political correctness when it comes to the whole "men vs. women" thing is suffocating, boring, energy consuming and f***ing depressing. In Denmark, there are tons of commercials, donations, national gatherings, radio ads, giant celebrity parties and much, much more to raise money for female breast cancer research.

Now, even though I really like the fact that we battle cancer, I felt that there was this strange "only women need help" mentality, which is bogus in a western world like ours.
