According to MedicineNet.com, mammary gland tumors are the most common of all tumors in dogs. Among unsprayed female dogs, the risk of mammary tumors is 26 percent, a level three times higher than that of women. Of those, 45 percent are cancerous and 55 percent are benign – again, a number higher than that seen in the human population.

"National Breast Cancer Awareness Month has had a tremendous impact on raising awareness of human breast cancer throughout the country," says Cindy Dunston Quirk. "That's a very good thing. Early detection is the best way to ensure that breast cancer in a dog is not a death sentence. Mammary tumors appear as either a solid mass or multiple swellings in the breast tissue. PetEducation.com says that a tumor will usually be very hard and difficult to move around under the skin. Once identified, only a biopsy performed by the veterinarian can tell for sure whether a tumor is benign or cancerous. As with humans, the options for treating breast cancer in dogs include surgery and chemotherapy or radiation. Surgery is usually the best option, as chemotherapy for dogs is considered less reliable than it is for men and women. Left untreated, the cancer will spread to lymph nodes and other parts of the body.

Early spaying is the best way to ensure that a female dog will not contract breast cancer. Dogs spayed prior to coming into heat for the first time have a very small incidence of mammary cancer. Dogs spayed after the first heat but prior to their third birthdays are also less likely to contract the disease than those who are spayed later in life, or not at all.

"Studies indicate that the possibility of breast cancer can be virtually eliminated in non-breeding dogs if they are spayed prior to the first heat," says Cindy. "Just as we strive to make the best choices for our furry friends in choosing the right foods and keeping them safe, we should all be aware of the possibility of avoiding breast cancer simply by having them spayed."
