Why the complexity of allergic disease is a concern

Allergic diseases are becoming more severe and complex, and the heaviest burden is on children and young adults. WAO has gathered data from 62 countries through its member societies that point to a consistent message that allergic diseases are reaching epidemic proportions in the world, now affecting 30 to 40 percent of the population, and are not being appropriately diagnosed and treated. WAO proposes: (1) increased availability and accessibility to allergy diagnosis and therapies as well as (2) advanced research toward preventive strategies to increase tolerance to allergens and slow disease progression and (3) global partnerships of multi-disciplinary teams, involving clinicians, academia, patient representatives, and industry.

These efforts can thereby prevent premature and unwanted deaths and improve patient quality of life.
