• 62 Ranking Lists Report Top 20 Colleges in Categories from Profs to Politics to Financial Aid

NEW YORK, August 20, 2012 / — According to a survey by The Princeton Review that asked 122,000 students at 377 top colleges to rate their schools on dozens of topics and report on their opinions and campus experiences at them, the best professors are at Sarah Lawrence College (NY). The college at which students are happiest with their financial aid (a keenly followed issue) is Princeton University (NJ). However, the college at which students report the highest overall satisfaction with their school choice is Claremont McKenna College (CA).

The Princeton Review reports the top 20 ranking colleges in these and 59 other categories on its website, <u>www.PrincetonReview.com</u> and in the 2013 edition of its book, "The Best 377 Colleges" (Random House / Princeton Review Books) on sale tomorrow in a print edition (\$23.99) and a new enhanced eBook edition (\$14.99).

Of interest to those following student political leanings this election year: the #1 school on the book's list, "Most Conservative Students" is Texas A&M University while Bard College (NY) tops the "Most Liberal Students" list. Ranking #1 for "Most Politically Active Students" is American University (DC).

Other lists in the book reveal the colleges at which students most highly rated their school's administrators, career services, health center, campus food, and dorms. The book's 62 ranking lists will post today on <u>www.PrincetonReview.com</u> as will the book's profiles of the colleges, which feature unique rating scores. The Princeton Review scores every school in the book from 60 to 99 in eight categories including Financial Aid, Fire Safety, and Green.

"Each of our 377 best colleges offers outstanding academics," says Robert Franek, the book's author and Princeton Review Senior VP / Publisher. "We don't rank them 1 to 377, because they differ widely in their program offerings and campus culture, and that is their strength. Instead, we tally lists of the top 20 schools in 62 categories based entirely on what students at these schools tell us about their campus experiences. Our goal is not to crown one college 'best' overall, but to help applicants find and get in to the college best for them."

## About the rankings and survey

The book's 62 ranking lists are based on surveys of 122,000 students (average 324 per campus) at the schools in the book during the 2011-12 and/or previous two school years. About 84% of the schools in the book appear on one or more its ranking lists. The 80-question survey asked students about their school's academics, administration, campus life, student body, and themselves. The surveys were completed at <u>http://survey.review.com</u>.

### About the ratings

The eight rating scores (60 to 99) are based primarily on institutional data collected during 2011-12. Three "Honor Rolls" in the book salute schools that received the highest score (99) for Financial Aid, Green, and Fire Safety. Other rating categories include Admissions Selectivity and Academics.

Annually published since 1992, "The Best 377 Colleges" is one of 150 Princeton Review books published by Random House.
