

## **Quick Facts about Golden Eagles**

- May have up to eight-foot wingspan and weigh up to 13 pounds in the wild more in captivity
- Typically mates for life, and may live 30 years in the wild and more than 40 years in captivity
- The most powerful aerial predator in North America, typically preying on rabbit-sized prey, but capable of killing animals as large as pronghorn and mule deer; is trained by elite falconers to kill deer, foxes, and even wolves in some parts of the world
- Distributed widely throughout the northern hemisphere; in North America most commonly encountered in open habitats of the West; declining in some areas due to habitat loss, and species of concern in some areas due to expanding energy development; has declined greatly in Central Europe, and more populated areas of its former range
- Considered sacred in many Native American Cultures especially Plains Indian Cultures; regarded as messenger to the Gods
- Also held in great esteem by many European and other cultures as a symbol of power, strength, and majesty . . .adorns the national flag or coat of arms of many nations, and is the most common national animal in the world, with five nations Mexico, Albania, Germany, Austria, and Kazakhstan making it the national animal
