RE: Hispanic Education Coalition Funding Priorities for FY 2014

Dear Representative:

On behalf of the Hispanic Education Coalition (HEC), which unites more than 20 organizations dedicated to improving educational opportunities and outcomes for the more than 54 million Latinos and Latinas living in the United States and Puerto Rico, we urge you to support the following critical programs that reach millions of Hispanic students.

As you are aware, sequestration went into effect on March 1, 2013. Your support is critical to help mitigate the widespread negative effect of these cuts on Latino children. Unlike in many other sectors, cuts to education programs have a multiplier effect on our needlest children. For example, sequestration will affect Latino high school students, many of whom are simultaneously beneficiaries of Title I Part C, Title III, TRIO, HEP, and GEAR UP. We request that the following education programs be funded at the following critical levels for fiscal year 2014.

² The HEC has long advocated for the William F. Goodling Even Start Family Literacy Program. Unfortunately, funding for this program was eliminated in 2011. To replace the Even Start Program, the administration proposed consolidating the program into an "effective Teaching and Learning" funding stream. This proposal has yet to be implemented. The Department of Education has found that there is a direct connection between parent literacy levels and the academic success of the child. A high proportion of the Even Start program participation was in the Hispanic community. Thus, a similar family literacy program is essential for the success of all Hispanic children. The HEC strongly recommends a dedicated funding stream specifically for the use of family literacy programs that integrate early childhood education, adult education, and parenting education.
