For the first time in 47 years, a new Catholic high school is opening in Greater Cincinnati's northern suburbs.

Royalmont Academy in Mason made headlines last year after buying the former Mason Heights Elementary school and its 16-acre campus.

School officials announced Royalmont's addition of grades 9-12 in the 2014-15 school year.

Royalmont will be the first new Catholic high school in Warren or Butler counties since Hamilton Badin High School in Hamilton opened in 1966.

The new high school reflects the growing populations in Warren and Butler counties, school officials said.

"We believe our location at our new 16-acre campus in Mason is ideally located to serve this population (growth) as well as neighboring Hamilton and Montgomery counties," said Ferraro.

Royalmont now offers kindergarten through eighth grade to more than 200 students but Ferraro anticipates enrollment will jump with the addition of high school grades and a new option for area parents interested in non-public school education for their children.

"And we will be the first K-12 Catholic school in Butler and Warren counties recognized by the Cincinnati Archdiocese," he said.

Royalmont has come to be known by their students who participate once a month in apostolic projects around the community. Whether they are raking leaves for neighbors, serving food at a soup kitchen, or going door-to-door inviting neighbors back to Church, their students have become well-known in several neighboring communities.

"I have celebrated mass at Royalmont Academy and I know that students learn about the importance of respecting the dignity of ALL human life," shared Father Frank Pavone, President of Priests for Life. "That's why I was so encouraged to hear that Royalmont will now be offering a high school program. Congratulations to the staff, administration and parents who made this happen. I wish Royalmont Academy High School success."
