

2013 CAMP MONACO PRIZE RECIPIENTS

The Prince Albert II of Monaco Foundation-USA has partnered with the Buffalo Bill Center of the West and the University of Wyoming's Biodiversity Institute to offer a \$100,000 grant to support scientific research and problem-solving in the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem. Its name—the Camp Monaco Prize—commemorates the wilderness camp that Prince Albert I of Monaco occupied during his historic visit to the Greater Yellowstone backcountry in 1913.

Dr. Arthur Middleton



Project Principal Investigator Arthur Middleton is a Donnelley Postdoctoral Associate at the Yale School of Forestry and Environmental Studies, Yale University, New Haven Connecticut. He works on the ecology of wildlife migration and the interactions of large carnivores and their prey. He also studies the influences of human disturbance in these systems with his current research focused on the northern Rocky Mountains and the southern Andes. Middleton has developed a sound track record of working collaboratively with wildlife agencies to design research projects and address specific management and conservation issues that cross traditional jurisdictional boundaries

Mr. Joe Riis



Project Co-Principal Investigator Joe Riis is a full-time wildlife photojournalist living in South Dakota and dedicated to working on threatened species and ecosystems. A *National Geographic Young Explorer* with degrees in wildlife management, and environmental and natural resources, Riis connects sound science with nature photography. He established himself as a photojournalist during his pioneering work on the Grand Teton pronghorn migration. In 2011, Riis received an Emmy for his pronghorn cinematography on the National Geographic *Great Migrations* series.
