Greetings!

On behalf of the American Society for Colposcopy and Cervical Pathology (ASCCP), we would like to invite you to the 2014 Biennial Scientific Meeting. The year, 2014, marks ASCCP's 50th Anniversary and we have an exciting program planned. The meeting will be held April 9-12, 2014 at the Westin Kierland Hotel in Scottsdale, Arizona.

This year's Biennial will be preceded by a full day of optional postgraduate courses which are designed to provide in-depth reviews of a wide variety of topics. This year's topics are:

- Vulvovaginal Diseases (including an optional hands-on Vulvar Suturing and Reconstructive Techniques workshop)
- Advanced Colposcopy: Implementing the Guidelines through Case-Based Images

Is this meeting right for me?

Celebrate ASCCP's 50th Anniversary at the 2014 ASCCP Biennial Scientific Meeting. The 2014 Biennial Scientific Meeting is designed to provide learners with a review of currently available screening and management guidelines along with the most up-to-date advances in the prevention, screening, diagnosis and treatment of lower genital tract disorders with an emphasis on human papillomavirus (HPV)-associated diseases and cervical cancer.

The ASCCP 2014 Biennial Scientific Meeting is intended for all health care providers from disciplines with interest in improving clinical outcomes of lower genital tract disorders —including gynecologists, family physicians, gynecologic oncologists, pathologists, dermatologists who deal with vulvar conditions, advanced practice clinicians (e.g. nurse practitioners, physician assistants, nurse midwives, nurses, etc.), residency directors of obstetrics/gynecology and family medicine programs, epidemiologists and laboratory scientists.

Meeting Competencies & Objectives

The scientific meeting reflects the current status of clinical knowledge in lower genital tract diagnosis and treatment including the Updated Consensus Guidelines for Managing Abnormal Cervical Cancer Screening Tests and Cancer Precursors. It is designed to improve medical knowledge, practice-based learning, patient outcomes, and/or systems-based practice. Specific goals are set for the learner to obtain upon completion of the meeting and it is expected the learner will be able to:

- Apply understanding of the epidemiology and natural history of HPV infections, cervical cancer precursors, and cervical cancer to screen for and manage these disorders. (medical knowledge);
- Manage abnormal HPV tests and HPV-associated disease in a way that reflects understanding of the biology, epidemiology, natural history, and immune response of HPV, including an understanding of the costs to society and to individuals of HPV infections (medical knowledge);
- Apply colposcopy to the management of lower genital tract disorders in ways that reflect its usefulness and limitations to maximize benefits and minimize harms to patients (medical knowledge; patient outcomes);
- Tailor guidelines for cervical cancer screening and management of cervical abnormalities to women in both the general population and in special circumstances using evidence derived from epidemiological, natural history and observational studies (systems-based practice, practice-based learning, patient outcomes, medical knowledge);
- Manage women with lower genital tract disorders from special populations, especially adolescent, postmenopausal, and underserved women, with insight into special problems encountered including HPV-associated anal disease (medical knowledge, practice-based learning, patient outcomes, systems-based practice);
- Apply HPV testing and relevant diagnostic tests to clinical practice in a directed, evidence-based, and cost-effective manner (medical knowledge, practice-based learning, patient outcomes, systems-based practice);
- Identify and vaccinate patients most likely to benefit from HPV vaccines, reflecting understanding of the efficacy, benefits, risks, and cost-effectiveness of the vaccines (medical knowledge, patient outcomes, interpersonal communications);
- Integrate into practice new insights from the latest research on diagnosis and management of lower genital tract disorders (medical knowledge, practice-based learning);
- Diagnose and treat lower genital tract disorders to include cervical, vaginal, vulvar, and anal intraepithelial neoplasia, genital warts, and other vulvar and vaginal diseases (medical knowledge, practice-based learning, systems-based practice).





Meeting Education Methods

Lectures: Each day, learners will attend general plenary sessions related to their areas of interest. Each session will conclude with a question and answer period led by the presenter(s) to reinforce core concepts. Throughout the lectures and question and answer periods, faculty members use an Audience Response System. The faculty uses these group responses to readdress items not answered correctly by the intended goal percentage. This immediate feedback helps course attendees identify their own weaknesses and allows them to follow up with the faculty onsite.

Clinical Abstract Sessions: Learners will have opportunities to be exposed to accepted abstracts of clinical research results, using both oral presentation and poster formats.

Panel Discussions: For selected topics, learners will direct questions to panels of experts on how to integrate reported advances into their practices. Experts will present their varying evidence-based perspectives so that learners can determine what may be best practice in their setting.



Debates: A series of debates will be presented on topics currently under discussion within the field and timely to the management of disorders of the lower genital tract. Faculty will represent the pros and cons of the specific practice or issue thus exposing the many facets necessary to evaluate and manage the clinical challenge under debate.

One-day Postgraduate Pre-courses

Advanced Colposcopy: Implementing the Guidelines through Cases: This course discusses the 2012 Updated Consensus Guidelines for the Management of Women with Abnormal Cervical Cancer Screening Tests and Cancer Precursors developed by ASCCP and experts representing 23 professional societies, federal agencies and national and international health organizations. These revised consensus guidelines are based on recent literature and data from approximately 1.4 million women within the Kaiser Permanente

Northern California (KPNC) Medical Care Plan on risk of CIN3, AIS and cancer after abnormal cervical screening tests. The new updates include recommendations for: extending screening intervals at all ages; decreasing intervention in women aged 21-24 with low grade cervical cytological abnormalities; management of abnormal cotesting results; postcolposcopy follow-up strategies using cotesting; exiting women from cervical cancer screening and other key clinical management issues. These recommendations can be challenging to apply to specific clinical situations. This workshop has been developed to provide clinicians with a working understanding of the rationale for the recommendations, as well as the ability to appropriately apply the guidelines. The course provides learners with opportunities to apply the guidelines in varied common specific cases and patient populations.



Cervical Intraepithelial Neoplasia Treatment: The ASCCP Cervical Intraepithelial Neoplasia (CIN) Treatment Course best serves those licensed physicians and advanced practice clinicians who are intermediate to advanced in their level of medical knowledge and colposcopic practice. Most participants are expected to be interested in learning various treatment methods so they can offer a wider range of treatments to the women in their communities. The course will provide practical information about treating patients with CIN by loop electrosurgical excision procedure (LEEP), cryotherapy, Cold Knife Cone, and laser treatment.

Participants will have either taken a basic colposcopy course or completed a colposcopy rotation in residency and desire more in-depth learning about LEEP and other treatment options. Since the course will not prepare participants for independent practice, upon successfully completing the course, learners are expected to participate in hands-on mentored-performance training as required for credentialing in new procedures by their home institutions. Course participants will likely be those with sufficient patient volume to ensure that LEEP and other treatment modality skills will be maintained.

Vulvovaginal Disease Diagnosis and Management: The Vulvovaginal Disease course is for all clinicians dealing with colposcopy or women's health. Although vaginal and vulvar complaints are common, many clinicians feel underprepared to deal with these issues. This one-day workshop will cover many aspects involving the diagnosis and treatment of these disorders. The morning session will focus on problems including: infectious diseases, fissures, high grade squamous intraepithelial lesions of the vulva, pruritus, and other rarer conditions. In the afternoon session, the attendee has the opportunity to choose one of two pathways: 1. Lecture session with a focus on vulvodynia, sexual issues and noninfectious vaginitis; 2. Surgical workshop on techniques used in vulvovaginal surgery, including grafts and flaps.
