A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

- 1 To amend Code Section 20-2-141 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the
- 2 review of competencies and core curriculum, so as to provide for the establishment of a
- 3 Curriculum Content Standards Advisory Council to review and revise competencies and
- 4 content standards; to provide for subcommittees; to provide for public hearings; to provide
- 5 for related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

7 SECTION 1.

- 8 Code Section 20-2-141 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to the review of
- 9 competencies and core curriculum, is amended by revising as follows:
- 10 "20-2-141.

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- 11 (a) Beginning on July 1, 2013, the State Board of Education shall establish a Curriculum
- 12 Content Standards Advisory Council to advise the state board in creating and adopting
- world-class competencies and content standards that will lead to college and career
- 14 readiness for all students. The advisory council shall include one curriculum director with
- expertise in curriculum and standards from the kindergarten through grade 12 education
- 16 community; three parent representatives; one certified elementary teacher, one certified
- middle school teacher, and one certified high school teacher, each employed by a local
- school system or retired from teaching in public school and each with at least ten years'
- 19 <u>teaching experience in core curriculum; two representatives from four-year institutions of</u>
- 20 <u>higher education; one representative from a technical college; one representative from the</u>
- 21 <u>business community; two local board members or superintendents from local school</u>
- 23 <u>board members or superintendents from local school systems appointed by the chairperson</u>

systems appointed by the chairperson of the House Committee on Education; and two local

of the Senate Education and Youth Committee. All members of the advisory council shall

- 25 Court members of supermembers from focus sensor systems uppointed by the charperson
- 25 <u>have completed at least a four-year college degree</u>. All members of the advisory council
- 26 <u>must be citizens of the State of Georgia for at least six months prior to appointment.</u>
- 27 <u>Members shall serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed for necessary</u>

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expenditures incurred in the performance of their duties as members of the advisory council. Members, as well as any members of their families or their business entities, shall not have conflicts of interest with regard to actions taken by the advisory council and shall not accept any money, meals, trips, gifts, or any other favors from any person, business, or organization that would benefit, financially or otherwise, from actions taken by the advisory council. The advisory council shall be as fairly balanced as reasonably possible with members from each of the congressional districts representing urban, suburban, and rural areas. Advisory council members shall serve no longer than four years. Each member rotating off the advisory council shall be replaced within 30 days. (b)(1) The advisory council shall establish a subcommittee for each of the subject areas of the curriculum content standards. Each subcommittee shall include among its required members at least the following: three certified teachers employed by local school systems or retired from teaching, whether in public or private schools, and having at least ten years' teaching experience with at least five years in the academic content area of the subcommittee; three parents of students enrolled in public school; one professor with a doctoral degree in the specific academic content area of the subcommittee who is employed by or has retired from a four-year institution of higher education; one member appointed by the chairperson of the House Committee on Education; and one member appointed by the chairperson of the Senate Education and Youth Committee. Subcommittees that address high school subject areas may also include one representative from a technical college and one representative from the business community. (2) All members of each subcommittee must be citizens of the State of Georgia for at least six months prior to appointment. Members shall serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed for necessary expenditures incurred in the performance of their duties as members of the advisory council. Members, as well as any members of their families or their business entities, shall not have financial conflicts of interest with regard to actions taken by the subcommittees or the advisory council and shall not accept any money, meals, trips, gifts, or any other favors from any person, business, or organization that would benefit, financially or otherwise, from actions taken by the subcommittees or the advisory council. Subcommittees shall be as fairly balanced as reasonably possible with members from urban, suburban, and rural areas. Subcommittee members shall serve no longer than four years. Each required member rotating off a subcommittee shall be replaced within 30 days. (3) Each subcommittee shall review the standards in effect in Georgia as of June 30, 2010, in its subject area to ensure that they contain clarity, rigor, content, depth, and coherence. For perspective, each subcommittee shall also examine curriculum reform

64 efforts over the past few decades to ensure that current efforts do not take place without
65 historical context of reform efforts. The subcommittee shall:

- (A) Review relevant research on the subject area and identify areas in the standards where revision is appropriate;
- (B) Examine curriculum standards for the subject area adopted by other states;
- 69 (C) Collect feedback on the standards from teachers, parents, and other stakeholders
- through the development of an online survey and make feedback available to the public
- 71 <u>via Internet posting; and</u>
- 72 (D) Solicit feedback from appropriate content related organizations, associations, and
- 73 <u>societies.</u>

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- 74 (4) Each subcommittee shall revise the standards to reflect its findings from the research
- 75 <u>conducted pursuant to paragraph (3) of this subsection.</u>
- 76 (5) Each subcommittee, through the Department of Education, shall provide an electronic
- 77 copy of the revised standards to each local school system and shall make such revised
- standards available to the public via Internet posting. Each local school system shall
- 79 <u>notify parents or guardians of its students that the curriculum content standards are being</u>
- 80 revised and that there is an opportunity to provide feedback. Each subcommittee, through
- 81 <u>the Department of Education, shall also provide an electronic copy of the revised</u>
- 82 <u>standards to the relevant department head of each institution of higher education in this</u>
- 83 <u>state. A public comment period of at least 60 days shall be provided, and each</u>
- 84 <u>subcommittee shall conduct at least one public hearing for the purpose of permitting the</u>
- public to comment on the rigor, clarity, and reasonableness of the standards developed
- by the subcommittee. The standards shall be revised as appropriate.
- 87 (6) At the conclusion of the revision process, each subcommittee shall submit the revised
- standards to the advisory council for its review and approval.
- 89 (c) Upon receipt of the revised standards from the subcommittees, the advisory council
- 90 <u>shall review and finalize the standards before forwarding them to the State Board of</u>
- 91 Education. The state board shall then present the standards during at least one public
- 92 <u>hearing held in every congressional district and at an open hearing before a joint committee</u>
- 93 <u>composed of the House Committee on Education and the Senate Education and Youth</u>
- 94 <u>Committee.</u>
- 95 The State Board of Education shall establish at least once every four years a review of the
- 96 adopted competencies and uniformly sequenced core curriculum by a task force broadly
- 97 representative of educational interests and the concerned public. After considering the
- 98 findings and recommendations of the task force, the state board shall make such changes
- 99 in the student competencies lists and core curriculum as it deems in the best interest of the

state and its citizens and shall report such proposed changes to local school systems and
 the General Assembly for review."
