



Background and Rationale:

Major financial institutions project Africa's economic growth rate at 5% this year. But 1 out of 5 Africans face food insecurity (UN Economic Commission for Africa).

With over 80% of the population in most African countries earning their living from agriculture, the issue of securing property rights over ancestral lands and addressing land grab has come to the fore. Land grab is creating violence and instability, in addition to food scarcity.

Permanent solutions will require land property rights that are nationally and internationally enforceable. It is encouraging to note that a few countries in Africa are now revising their development approach by challenging unfair land grabbing practices. But more needs to be done.


Through this event, PLAD has brought together the African diaspora and other stakeholders to consult on lasting solutions.


