Here in the legendary land of tulips and windmills, we navigate our way by pedalling the endless towpaths, bike paths, polders and dykes that dot the land. After a visit to UNESCO Kinderdijk, we venture south into Flanders in Belgium, whose cultural heart, Bruges, is a work of art unto itself. Stately Flemish architecture soars over tranquil canals and bustling squares, testament to the creative might of its spinners, tapestry-makers, and artists centuries ago. Kids can channel the creativity too: sand-castle building, painting, artisanal chocolate lessons. The journey is quite simply a masterpiece for all ages.

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## the journey

#### Days 1 & 2

#### The Hague & Medieval Leiden

WE RENDEZVOUS IN AMSTERDAM AND DRIVE OUT TO KATWIJK aan Zee, a delightful seaside resort not far from the mouth of the Old Rhine. We'll meet up with our bikes and pedal out along the beach and into the rugged dunes, all the while enjoying our first experience (of many) on Holland's first-rate bike paths. With a few kilometres logged, we pause for lunch at Pannenkuikenhuis, whose name is as much a mouthful as the scrumptious pancakes (think crepes) that are served there. After lunch, kids ride on to nearby Scheveningen for a lesson in sandcastle construction from a professional sandcastle builder – yes, such a thing exists! Meantime, adults ride through to The Hague to check in and then pay a visit to another sand-themed attraction: the spectacular Panorama Mesdag. Located right beside our hotel in its original location, the panorama is a striking 360-degree painting of the Dutch coastline in the 19thC. Families reunite for a little exploration time before we sit down altogether for dinner on the hotel's terrace – perched, most appropriately, above a canal.

The next morning's destination is Leiden, the quintessential Dutch city of tree-lined canals, outdoor cafes, and deep artistic heritage. Kids, in fact, will hop off their bikes earlier in Wassenaar, then drive to Leiden for a special Rembrandt tour and drawing lesson led by our friend Willem, an art teacher and historian. Separately, adults will walk the town in the expert company of our guide Marike, who will enlighten us with her animated narration of Leiden's lively past. After a light lunch, adults remount to bike back to The Hague, while the junior set drives over to Madurodam, a very cool representation of Holland's greatest hits in miniature. Back at the hotel in the evening, the generations split up again: grown-ups enjoy a tasting of the Dutch gin known as jeneever ahead of a savoury Indonesian dinner; the young ones instead have a casual burger.

#### HOTEL

#### Hilton The Hague, The Hague

The erstwhile central post office of the city has been expertly renovated and repurposed to this fine hotel. And 'central' is the operative word, as it sits just steps from the city's best restaurants, shopping and the Royal Castle. B&R has secured Executive rooms that include access to the private lounge on the top floor, with views across the city's skyline.

#### THE BIKING

Day 1: A 29 km (18 mi.) flat ride on bike paths through sand dunes and seaside villages.

Day 2: Adults ride 32 km (20 mi.) in and out of towns on flat bike paths; kids ride only the first 10 km (6 mi.) in the morning before being whisked off for activities.

### Day 3 Rural Holland and Gouda Cheese

After breakfast and a farewell to The Hague, adults will pedal eastward out into the rich fields and pastures of the Dutch countryside. Cows abound, so it's no great surprise to happen upon the town of Gouda, home of the eponymous (and delicious) mild cheese. We'll taste the round, gold-skinned local product, but also avail ourselves of the good shopping, including perhaps the country's best *stroopwafels*, the honey-drenched thin waffle that has powered many a B&R biker down the years. The kids will arrive in Gouda by van to partake in a treasure hunt that includes the city landmark Sint Jans Kerk church. Families meet up for a lunch on your own on the sprawling main square and then ride together the remaining distance to our next hotel. Dinner tonight is in its stylish dining room.

#### HOTEL

#### De Arendshoeve, Bergambacht

This newly remodeled hotel reopened its doors in February of 2012. Situated in the heart of the polders, with a spa and indoor pool, it is an excellent place to relax after a long day of riding. The rooms are spacious with all the comforts you need.

#### THE BIKING

*Day 3:* For adults, a 40 km (25 mi.) flat ride on bike paths through the polders (low-lying farmland) via Gouda. Kids ride the last 17 km (11 mi.) in the afternoon only.

#### Days 4 & 5 Kinderdijk to Bruges

Today is a highlight! We begin with a leisurely departure from the hotel – perhaps preceded by a morning soccer game for the kids on the wide lawn – for the quiet ride across and then along the River Lek to Kinderdijk. A UNESCO World Heritage site, Kinderdijk is the largest surviving agglomeration of traditional windmills in Europe. Once there, we'll walk the towpaths among the mills, learning about their function (they didn't actually mill anything!) and role as not just machines but also family homes. Photo ops abound. Time permitting, we'll



#### HOTEL

#### The Dukes' Palace, Bruges

Our final hotel is a former aristocratic residence right in the heart of the UNESCO World Heritage city of Bruges. If the myriad allures of the city can be resisted, the Dukes' Palace offers sauna, hammam and fitness centre amenities, as well as a private garden where kids can make themselves at home.

#### THE BIKING

*Day 4:* A 16 km (10 mi.) flat ride on bike paths and quiet roads to Kinderdijk; longer option available.

Day 5: Adults ride 40 km (20 mi.) in and out of Bruges on flat bike paths and quiet roads; kids ride only the first 18 km (11 mi.) in the morning before being whisked off for a picnic and activities.

even take in the short historical film documentary about the site's history, before adjourning by bike to a nearby restaurant for a light lunch, where our day's riding ends. We'll spend much of the afternoon driving across the south of Holland into Belgium, arriving in Bruges in the late afternoon. After settling into our digs, we set out together for a private sunset boat cruise through the city's picturesque canals; again, have cameras at the ready as a

local expert narrates our voyage. We'll disembark in the heart of Bruges' lively restaurant scene, from which each family is free to choose a venue for an on-your-own dinner.

With Flemish textiles and trade in the ascendant, 800 years ago Bruges was among the wealthiest cities in Europe, and the legacy of its status remains evident in its stately feel and marvelous architecture. We'll follow bike paths out of this compelling cityscape into the surrounding countryside, where steeples mark the approach to quaint villages, with the occasional windmill thrown in to commune with its Dutch neighbours. Adults can choose among the eateries in these towns for lunch, while the kids are shuttled back into Bruges for a picnic lunch and then a real treat, literally: a hands-on chocolate-making demonstration at a chocolate museum housed in a 15thC palace. Chocolate, along with waffles, is a world-renowned Belgian specialty, and the kids will get full immersion into its history - and taste! Time is left for them, reunited with parents, to work up their appetites anew with some unstructured exploration of Bruges, before we cap our week together with dinner in a brasserie serving fine regional fare.

#### Day 6 Homeward Bound

We'll say our goodbyes over breakfast this morning at The Dukes' Palace before departures to the airport and onwards. Your guides will be happy to assist you with your travel plans.

# A Country in Bloom

Growing up in Holland, one of my favourite times of year was late-winter, when the ice begins to melt. Every morning I would look through the kitchen window to see if the first *krokusje* (crocus) had poked through the soil in our little front yard. Its arrival meant spring was on its way and Holland would soon be covered in crocuses, hyacinths and tulips. It was always a surprise to see what colour the flowers would be each year.

The Dutch have their own creative ways of celebrating the rest of the year: we bring in the New Year with the *Nieuwjaarsduik*, a plunge into the freezing waters off the coast of the Hague's Scheveningen Beach. As the temperatures turn even colder, we wait for the canals to freeze over so we can go ice skating, with lots of breaks at the little snack bars lined up on the shore selling *koek* and *zopie* (cookies and drinks), split-pea soup and hot chocolate.

But it's not until spring that we finally get to enjoy two of Holland's greatest gifts in tandem: biking and flowers. Whether it is spring or summer, the bike paths are lined with camelias, *viooltjes*, tulips and impatiens. In town, flowerbeds run along the lanes, and as you cycle past homes you can peek through the windows and see bouquets on almost every table.




Holland is all about flowers. It is a custom to offer flowers when you visit a Dutch home for any occasion: birthday, wedding or just to say thanks. And even on the dreariest winter day, we believe a simple bouquet brings out the sun and reminds us that the first crocus is already waiting to appear.

#### LEVEL OF ACTIVITY

#### Occasional

The riding throughout the trip is very flat and mostly on dedicated bike paths, which are beautifully constructed and marked in the region – and often have their own traffic signals! We ride into and out of two fairly large cities, The Hague and Bruges, yet rarely have to contend with what would be typically called 'city traffic,' due to the bike paths. Bikers will feel safe at all times.

#### MORE INFO

#### How do I get to Amsterdam?

Most transatlantic flights to Holland arrive in Amsterdam to Schiphol Airport, just 15 km outside of Amsterdam; many European and domestic flights also land here. There are numerous ways of getting into Amsterdam from the airport, but the most trouble-free method is by train. The trains are swift and extremely punctual. The fare to downtown is €6.60 for first class. The train station lies under the airport, and trains run approximately every 10 minutes; it's a 20-minute trip directly to Central Station, in downtown Amsterdam. Another easy alternative to the city from Schiphol is by taxi. The fare downtown is approximately €45, and the ride should take about 20-30 minutes.
