### Data-driven analysis from real users

  - Careers by interest
  - Careers by salary
  - Gender and ethnicity
- Sample size:
  - We have tracked satisfaction data for over 37,000 users from May 2015 to July 2016
  - This data comes from these 37,000 unique users, who have provided career histories and feedback

### **Defining Satisfaction**

Users are asked to rank careers on the following 5 categories to determine satisfaction:

### **Overall Rating**

Overall Rating measures a user's general sentiment about their career. Not to be confused with Blended Rating, which is Sokanu's measure of their average overall satisfaction across the five dimensions of fit.

#### **Skill Utilization Rating**

Skill utilization rating is a measure of the degree to which users felt their skills were put to use in the career.

### **Work Environment Rating**

Work environment includes career characteristics such as working hours, organizational structure, and working conditions.

#### **Personality Rating**

Fit rating measures a user's sense of how well their personality fit with their career. Examples of personality traits include leadership, extraversion, and persistence.

#### **Interest Rating**

Interest rating measures the degree to which users found the subjet matter of their work interesting.


### **Blended Rating**

A straight average of the other five ratings. Not to be confused with the user's overall rating, this rating is calculated, not prompted from user.

# Insights

### Insight 1: Money can't buy happiness

#### Salary vs. Satisfaction



2014 median US salary vs. average overall rating

- No meaningful correlation between salary and satisfaction
- No career with an average satisfaction score greater than 4 (aka satisfied with career) earns more than \$100k (save CEO)

- Creative arts rank highly, as do helping professions (physicians, counselors, education)
- As a career category,
  law ranks lowest,
  despite higher earning
  potential

### Insight 2: Creativity and Control Make us Happy

- CEOs have the highest career satisfaction index
- Creative pursuits rank extremely high:
  - Illustrators
  - Film directors
  - Authors
  - Singers
  - Art directors
- Entrepreneurs also rank high for career satisfaction
  - Being in control of one's pursuits (in the corporate or artistic spheres) linked to high satisfaction



### Insight 3: Service and Clerical Careers are not Happy

All of the industries below ranked poorly (< 3):

- Finance ranks poorly
  - Financial clerk
  - Bill and account collector
  - Teller
- Service industry linked to discontentment
  - Caterer
  - Food server
  - Cashier, food delivery truck driver, housecleaner
- Janitor ranks lowest for career satisfaction




### Insight 4: Satisfaction by Interest Categories

#### **Overall Satisfaction Rating by Dominant Career Holland Codes**


Careers categorized based on highest scoring Sokanu career scale value
