The Eureka! Inclusive Mission: Establish an intentionally inclusive and universally designed TK-Grade 8 public charter school reflective of the cultural, linguistic, social, and learning diversity of students in the neighborhoods of San Jose Unified School District. In accordance with the Universal Design for Learning framework, the Eureka! Inclusive curriculum will be an integrated curriculum that emphasizes the arts, humanities, and global social studies. Our students will graduate on-track and ready to take with confidence the next step on their academic and life pathway.

The Eureka! Inclusive Vision: Our vision is that Eureka! Inclusive will serve students with unmet needs in San Jose Unified and that its success will promote the growth of inclusive, universally designed, relationship based, schools throughout Santa Clara County.

Our Commitment: Eureka's commitment to the academic success of all children is neither neutral nor inconsequential. It is the pedagogical challenge of our time that we can and should meet if we are to educate and prepare students to be 21st century civically engaged members of the global community. Eureka! Inclusive will set a new standard of expectation and outcomes for student subgroups that have suffered too long under the myth of inability.

Philosophy

"At the core of what schools are about is relationships...You can get the curriculum right, but if the relationships are not right, the school will not succeed."-Cavanaugh

Eureka! Inclusive has adopted a humanistic philosophy of inclusion and diversity, which recognizes that inclusion is not merely about including one group of students, rather it is based on the value that *no student should be excluded*. Informed by emerging research from the field of translational developmental neuroscience and in accordance with the Universal Design for Learning framework, the Eureka! Inclusive curriculum will be universally designed and emphasize the arts, humanities, and global social studies. Eureka! will connect teaching and learning meaningfully to the outside world thereby strengthening students, the community, families, schools and the larger society. Our students will graduate on-track and ready to take with confidence the next step towards high school, college, career, and life pathway. The Eureka! Inclusive model of inclusion is strengthened by a solid philosophical foundation of the basic human rights of all children to be included in society and anchored by four shared principles:

- Nurturing Relationships are essential to the healthy development of all children.
- Nurturing Environments are essential to healthy explorations for all children.
- Equal access to curriculum is essential to academic success for all children.
- Childhood should be filled with wonder, joy, friends, and play!



Overview of Eureka! Inclusive Educational Program and School Design

The Universal Design for Learning (UDL) Framework The UDL framework guides the strategic design of curriculum and school based supports to ensure that all students have access to all aspects of the curriculum.

Eureka! Inclusive Integrated Arts Curriculum "Arts Integration is an approach to teaching in which students construct and demonstrate understanding and engage in a creative process which connects an art form and another subject area and meets evolving objectives in both." Kennedy Art Center

Eureka! Inclusive Classroom Teaching Teams provide 1:12 teacher to student ratio and are comprised of general and special education teachers, occupational therapists, and language specialists. Our teams recognize potential, nurture confidence, encourage inquiry, and guide learning.

Eureka! Inclusive Academics are inquiry based, common core aligned, and develop the whole child. It consists of four interwoven program elements: academic, social, physical, and emotional development.

Eureka! Inclusive Daily Designated Learning Hour Students will be flexibly grouped during the designated learning hour to focus on individual areas of challenge or strength. Small group instruction for GATE, ELD, RSP, Social Skills, and Occupational Therapy will be offered weekly at the same hour every day so that students that fall into multiple categories have the opportunity to receive the extra support they need.

Eureka! Inclusive's MADE by ME is a daily, student driven exploration period and is an extension of our belief that learning occurs naturally when humans feel safe to explore, inquire, and express. Mentors work with students at all grade levels to oversee student-directed special projects, productions, and electives.

Eureka! Inclusive Technology Toolbox: Silicon Valley Technology opens doors to classrooms around the world. Through technology, children share experiences, exchange thoughts, and form friendships. Technology, in particular digital media, makes UDL implementation practical and achievable in a diverse classroom. Digital materials make it possible for the same material to be flexibly presented and accessed – even adapted on a student-to-student basis.

Eureka! Inclusive Instructional Lunch teachers and children share family style lunches together. During this time teachers provide mini lessons on healthy eating habits, nutrition, reinforce table manners and good hygiene.

Eureka! Inclusive Morning Movement Each morning begins with movement! Dancing, yoga, walking, and other forms of movement help children wake up their brains, improve focus, and enhance learning.

Eureka! Inclusive Family and Community Partnerships are important to a happy school and to student success. Weekly and monthly community events such as Community Art Walks, Family Dinner Nights, Interactive Board Meetings, Communication Café Family Lounge, Health and Wellness Resource Center, and Family Learning Experiences are all examples of the Eureka! Inclusive design.

Small School Environment

We have chosen a smaller school model for Eureka! Inclusive for many reasons, a few of which are:

- Small school size supports the emphasis on nurturing relationships across the school community.
- Small school size improves students' outcomes on grades and test scores.
- Students with special needs, including so-called "at-risk," "exceptional," "disadvantaged," and "gifted" students, are better served by smaller school units.

Multi-Age Classrooms

At Eureka students are grouped in multi age classrooms, within three developmental stages, based more upon their personal interests, learning abilities, and stage of social and emotional development rather than their physical age. The multi-age system assumes that all children, even children of the same age, are different in their development and needs; that children construct their own knowledge in their own way; that learning should be child-centered, not curriculum-centered; and that education is a process, not a product. The Founders: Charter schools are started when community members see an educational need and decide to actively address it. Eureka! is purely a parent initiated and funded effort to address a documented need.

Tiffany Maciel, attended Olinder Elementary and San Jose High School and is the parent of two students with learning disabilities in SJUSD. Vanessa Wallace graduated from SJSU and has two children with learning disabilities in SJUSD. Both women met while serving as chair and vice chair of the SJUSD Community Advisory Committee for Special Education.

The Board: Every charter school is required by law to have a board of directors that is ultimately responsible for what the school does. Legally, the board oversees the operations of the school and makes sure it is financially sound and follows the law. The Board also helps to create the vision for how the school should operate, and is often made up of parents of children attending the charter school. Eureka! Has three designated board seats for parents of students that fall into one of three identified risk categories, SWD, EL, and economically disadvantaged.

A Founding Parent is someone who is committed to the mission and vision of Eureka! Inclusive and wants to take on a leadership role and actively participate in opening the first intentionally inclusive and universally designed school on Santa Clara County! Activities include talking to SJUSD parents that might be seeking the alternative educational experience Eureka offers, attend meetings with governing boards of education, local politicians, and community agencies that could be potential partners. Participating in the decision making process for before and after school care, enrichments, school calendar, hiring process, and lunch program, developing the Eureka! Family Handbook, and so much more! Enrollment preference can only be given for up to 10% of the schools families, we have 12 spots available! Founding Parents <u>are not required</u> to give financially to the school, and financial donations are not taken in lieu of volunteer time.

Top 10 Frequently Asked Questions

- 1. How many students: First year 150 Total size of school: 225
- 2. When are we opening: Proposed opening Fall 2018 Where:In talks with SJUSD Allen has been identified as an option.
- 3. **Before/After school care:** Currently meeting with prospective providers.
- 4. Uniforms: We will provide every student with a school t-shirt, but uniforms are not required
- 5. **Lunch program:** We will be members of federal school free and reduced lunch program and will decide with parents on additional meal solutions.
- 6. School hours: Grades TK-2 9:30-3:30 Grades 3-8 8:30-3:30 (playground supervised at 8 am)
- 7. **Any required parent participation:** We respect that our families are busy and do not require parent volunteers to supplement our programs, however, parent participation is welcome, and we provide a parent lounge, and host several family community events a month.
- 8. **Entrance Tests:** Testing is not required to get into the school, however, we believe in the power of early identification of learning strengths/challenges, and we have developed a comprehensive universal screening protocol to ensure children receive the supports and enhancement they need to feel welcome, and be successful from day 1!
- 9. **Any tuition fees:** No tuition fees, public school!
- 10. What will happen if I sign the petition: You will receive a phone call from San Jose Unified verifying your name, address, school your child/children currently attend, and your interest in enrolling your child/children at Eureka! Inclusive if it is approved for 2018/2019 school year.
