

SINKHOLE WARNING SIGNS

Dramatic sinkhole events that gobble cars in parking lots and open huge cracks in the ground make for vivid news footage, but they are a rarity and **NOT the norm**. In most cases, sinkholes operate on a much smaller and slower scale. Frequently, they announce themselves with warning signs of instability below the ground – on your property or nearby. The **right solution**, executed in time, can restore stability and preserve the value of your home.

Your best protection against sinkholes is awareness. Know the signs and be prepared to act if you suspect a problem. The usual chain of events is as follows:

- (1) homeowner notifies insurance provider of suspected sinkhole activity;
- (2) insurer sends a geotechnical expert to inspect property, prepare report and if necessary, suggest a remediation plan of action;
- (3) homeowner selects a remediation firm to carry out the plan of action.

HOME INTERIOR:

- New cracks in walls or floors
- Doors and windows that no longer open and close properly

HOME EXTERIOR:

- Stair-step-shaped cracks on exterior walls
- Newly exposed glimpses of foundation
- Cracking or buckling of the concrete slab



IN THE YARD:

- Trees that slump or tilt
- Sagging or leaning fence posts
- Small, circular patches of wilting vegetation
- Small, post-rainstorm ponds that have not appeared in the past
- Depressions or cracks in the ground
- Well water contaminated with mud, dirt and/or debris

 Chimney-shaped tunnels in the ground that drop directly to the aquifer. These sinkhole "chimneys" can pose a serious risk factor. Fence and notify your county emergency management coordinator immediately.

IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD:

 Be on guard if other homes in your neighborhood are tested for sinkhole activity or if sinkhole activity is confirmed in a neighborhood nearby. Since sinkholes seem to run on a fault line, pay attention to problems on streets that lie behind of and in front of your house, as well as those to either side.
