One of the top pleasure cruising lakes in the U.S., Lake Champlain offers boaters extraordinary views and attractions including historic forts, charming lighthouses and quiet beaches. Consistent winds make the lake a favorite among sailors while naturally deep bays and inlets provide great anchorage and protection for overnight stays.

Fishing

The Adirondack Coast offers some of the best fishing on the planet with Lake Champlain earning the reputation as the best smallmouth fishery in North America. Its deep waters don't just harbor world-class bass but more than 80 different species of warm and cold-water fish including walleye, landlocked

salmon, northern pike and lake trout. As some tight-lipped anglers know, there's more to fishing the Adirondack Coast than Lake Champlain, many other lakes, rivers, streams and ponds are teeming with fish and unlimited possibilities. Discover the more than 3,000 lakes and ponds, and 30,000 miles of brooks and streams awaiting you in the Adirondacks.

Windsurfing

Big wind and big water combine on Lake Champlain to offer some of the best inland windsurfing in the East. A strong south wind and more than 100 miles of fetch almost guarantee waves over four feet high, perfect for forwards, table tops and rolls. Check out favorite windsurfing haunts including Cumberland Bay in Plattsburgh and Ausable Point which features a beach area and jetty dedicated to windsurfing.
