The opening events are a welcome and tribute to veterans across the United States of America and are free and open to the community. KEYNOTE SPEAKER: EDWARD TICK, PH.D

Friday, January 29th, 2016



Edward Tick, Ph.D., Director and Co-founder of Soldier's Heart. He is also a Soldier's Heart Senior Program Leader and Trainer.

Honored for his groundbreaking work in the spiritual, holistic and community-based healing of veterans with Post-traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), Dr. Tick has been a psychotherapist for 41 years, specializing in working with veterans since the 1970s. He is the author of *Sacred Mountain, The Practice of Dream Healing, The Golden Tortoise, Wild Beasts and Wandering Souls* and the award-winning book *War and the Soul*. Ed's most recent book, *Warrior's Return*, was published in November 2014.

Dr. Tick is an internationally recognized educator and expert on veterans, PTSD, and the psychology of military-related issues. He has conducted trainings, retreats and workshops across the country and overseas. He has lectured and trained staff and worked with wounded warriors at West Point, Walter Reed Army Medical Center, Fort Hood, Fort Knox, Altus Air Force Base and other Department of Defense facilities. The Department of Defense now uses his pioneering work and he was the U.S. Army's 2012 trainer for its annual Chaplain Sustainment Training in PTSD.

He is a tireless advocate for war-healing and peace-making, lecturing around the world and leading semi-annual educational, healing and reconciliation journeys to Vietnam and Greece.

Dr. Tick is a gifted healer, teacher and guide specializing in psycho-spiritual, cross-cultural, and international reconciliation practices to bring healing and hope to veterans, communities and nations recovering from the traumas of war and violence. His honors and teaching posts include:

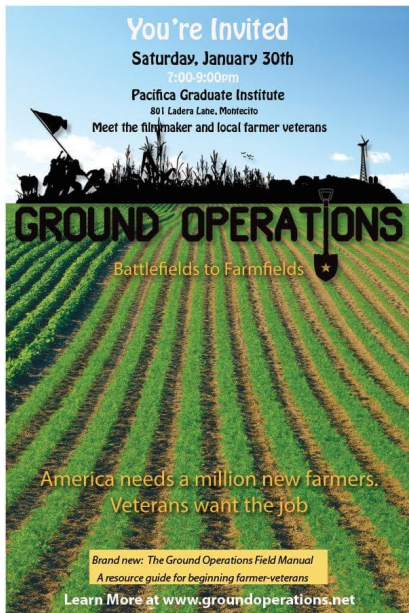

GROUND OPERATIONS: Battlefields to Farm Fields is an award-winning documentary film and social action campaign created to strengthen the growing network of combat veterans transitioning into organic farming, pastured livestock ranching and artisan food production. The documentary won the *Audience Favorite* award at DocUtah International Film Festival and the *Solutions Award* for the Aware Guide’s Transformational Film Festival.

SYNOPSIS: Veterans from the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan face a difficult transition to civilian life, marked by high unemployment, prescription drug addiction and staggering suicide rates. They need a place to de-escalate from the high-velocity impact of combat. They are service-driven

people who need a new mission. Coincidentally, half of American farmers have reached retirement age and the USDA is calling for *one million new farmers and ranchers* in the next 10 years to fill the coming gap. Agriculture’s problem is the veterans’ solution. **Ground Operations** follows an ensemble of young men and women who tell us why they joined the military, how the war changed them, how they’ve struggled to return home and ultimately, how they found organic farming and ranching to be the answer to a dream. These veterans blow the lid of any stereotypes and you’ll be rooting for them all the way to your local farmers market. In a world full of problems, **Ground Operations** is a story about solutions.

Producer/Director, Dulanie Ellis had a career as a script supervisor on feature films for 20 years. Glen Slater, Ph. D., is a Pacifica core faculty member and Associate Chair of the Jungian and Archetypal Studies program. He has taught Jungian and archetypal psychology for over twenty years and contributed a number of articles to Jungian journals and essay collections. Glen also edited and introduced the third volume of James Hillman's Uniform Edition, *Senex & Puer*, as well as a volume of essays by Pacifica faculty, *The Varieties of Mythic Experience*. His areas of interest and research include psyche and technology, the psychology of religion and psyche and film.



Dennis Patrick Slattery Ph.D. received the prominent rank of Distinguished Core Faculty at Pacifica Graduate Institute where he helped shape the development of the Mythological Studies program. He has been teaching for 44 years from elementary to secondary, undergraduate, and graduate programs. His areas of emphasis include the poetic imagination, writing and reading as mythic activities, the relation of psyche, spirit and matter, and the place of contemplation within the academic setting. He is the author of several books including: *The Idiot: Dostoevsky's Fantastic Prince*; *The Wounded Body: Remembering the Markings of Flesh*; *Grace in the Desert: Awakening to the Gifts of Monastic Life*; *Harvesting Darkness: Essays on Literature, Myth, Film and Culture*; *A Limbo of Shards: Essays on Memory, Myth and Metaphor*; *Riting Myth, Mythic Writing: Plotting Your Personal Story*; and *Creases in Culture: Essays Towards a Poetics of Depth*. With Lionel Corbett he has co-edited *Depth Psychology: Meditations in the Field* as well as *Psychology at the Threshold*. With Glen Slater, he has co-edited *Varieties of Mythic Experience: Essays on Religion, Psyche and Culture*. With Jennifer Selig, he has co-edited *Reimagining Education: Essays On Reviving the Soul Of Learning*. He is the author of three volumes of poetry: *Casting Shadows*; *Just Below the Water Line*; and *Twisted Sky*. He serves as the faculty advisor to *Between*, the student literary journal as well as *The Mythological Studies Journal*, the student on-line journal, both published by the Mythological Studies Program.



Jennifer Selig, Ph.D. joined Pacifica's faculty in 2005, and has served as Chair and Research Coordinator in the Depth Psychology program before moving into her current role as core faculty. Her books include *Thinking Outside the Church: 110 Ways to Connect With Your Spiritual Nature*; *Reimagining Education: Essays on Retrieving the Soul of Learning*; *The Soul Does Not Specialize: Revaluing the Humanities and the Polyvalent Imagination* which she co-edited with Dr. Dennis Slattery, a Mythological Studies professor

at Pacifica; and *Integration: The Psychology and Mythology of Martin Luther King, Jr. and His (Unfinished) Therapy With the Soul of America*.



Elizabeth Nelson, Ph.D. is core faculty and Dissertation Policy Director at Pacifica Graduate Institute. She teaches a broad range of courses in research process, methodology, and dissertation development along with courses in dream, imagery, literature, and cultural studies. Her own research interests include personal, cultural, and mythic expressions of the shadow, gender, and power. Dr. Nelson is the author of two books, *The Art of Inquiry: A Depth Psychological Perspective* (Spring Publications, 2005, coauthored with Joseph Coppin) and *Psyche's Knife: Archetypal Explorations of Love and Power* (Chiron, 2012). A professional writer and editor for more than 30 years, she coaches aspiring authors across a variety of genres and styles.



Cindi Anderson, Ph.D., With a doctorate in Mythology, emphasis in Archetypal Psychology, and over two decades working with leading marketing and media companies, Cindi Anderson brings a rare combination of in-depth, hands-on experience and theoretical knowledge to all levels of brand development and direct marketing. Her commercials are seen around the globe, and she has launched some of the most successful brands sold direct to consumer. His dissertation investigated the veteran's inward journey and recovery upon leaving the service. Currently he works as a Veterans Service Officer with the Vietnam Veterans of America helping veterans and their families, of all eras, apply for and receive their veterans' benefits.
