WHO WE ARE

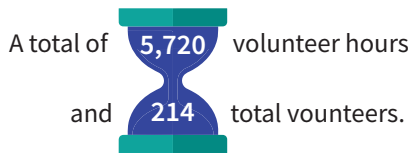
The Annapolis region is forever linked with the Chesapeake Bay, the oyster industry, and a proud maritime history. This history, which includes the environmental impacts of an over-harvested oyster population, must be preserved, remembered, and understood by all future stewards of our environment.

Education programs have grown ten-fold in the last decade. With the park expansion, projected enrollment for 2018 is 10,000 students.

The Annapolis Maritime Museum & Park (AMMP) provides this critical link between maritime heritage and Bay ecology education. A 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, AMMP brings to life the distinctive role that Annapolis has played for generations in the maritime industry through exhibits, lectures, and programs held at our two campuses located on Back Creek.

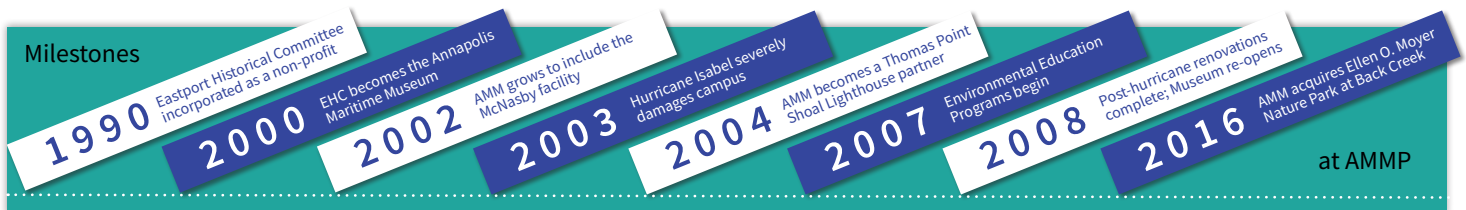

McNasby Campus

The last oyster packing plant in Annapolis serves as the home of the Museum. With a direct view of the Bay, the campus includes the McNasby building, Barge House, three piers, and an adjacent beach with a historic wooden boat exhibit. The Museum is open six days a week and admission is free.



Back Creek Park Campus

This renovated 12-acre Park, located across Back Creek, accommodates AMMP's ever-expanding education programs and places the Museum in a stronger position to fulfill its mission. An old waterworks building on site has been restored and converted to classrooms for hosting school programs and summer camps. Future plans include event space and a maritime village.
