We recognize that men must help us in changing the leadership landscape for girls and young women.

We are honored to present this year's award to a community leader who not only believes in the power of every girl and woman to change the world, but publicly champions opportunities to make that ideal a reality. Russell Cox, President and CEO of Norton healthcare has done just that. Award is being presented to Madalyn O'Dea, a student at the University of Cincinnati. Madelyn is a 2018 graduate of Christian Academy of Louisville and was a Girl Scout for 13 years earning both the Bronze and Gold Awards. The gold Award was started by the Girl Scouts in 1916, the best and brightest undertook projects that improved their communities and the world. The Gold Award has inspired girls to find the greatness inside themselves and share their ideas and passions with their communities. As a Gold Award recipient you are part of an elite group of young women.

Madalyn is already an accomplished artist who has received several local and regional awards in art and holds several state and national records in track and cross country. Madalyn is attending University of Cincinnati on a full athletic scholarship and is majoring in design, architect, art and planning. Madalyn's Gold project aimed to help children to better understand and process their emotions. She feels that by helping children to gain a better understanding of their feelings, they will be able to handle uncomfortable situations better in the future. In order to accomplish this, she developed a Healthy Feelings color book with the help of various professionals including a child therapist. The coloring

book is available in book or electronic format in both English and Spanish and due to several partnerships she has been able to provide it at no cost. Her coloring book has been shared with outlets reaching over 125,000 children nationwide and internally through programs associated with private counseling services, Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA), and other organizations. Earlier this year, the book was shared at the CASA national convention in Boston and Madaylyn recently joined first Lady Glenna Bevin to present it at the Kentucky CASA convention that was held in late August.

According to Jill's Troop leader, Jill Solon, "Madalyn O'Dea has been a Girl Scout for 13 years, beginning as a Daisy Scout and recently becoming a Lifetime Scout member upon graduation from high school. During her time as a Girl Scout, Maddie has assumed leadership roles by learning the importance of teamwork and the appreciation of her own individuality. Madalyn has carried out these traits, not only in the Girl Scout world by being an active participant in her troop, an Appalachian Trail Adventurer and more recently, as the mentor for the Junior Girl Scout Troop, but also by assuming these roles in her high school and current college career."

9:30 a.m. Dawne: WHY GIRLS NEED GIRL SCOUTS

Girl Scouts works, and we have the research to prove it. A recent Girl Scout Research Institute study found that Girl Scouts shine above their non-Girl Scout peers in leadership, academics, career aspirations and hope for the future. One particularly significant finding was that Girl Scouts can buffer girls against negative outcomes during one of the most crucial times in their lives: the middle-school years. Unlike their non-Girl Scout peers, middle-school Girl Scouts exhibit a lift in their sense of self rather than a decline. Their desire to solve problems in their communities actually increases during middle school, compared with a dramatic drop in interest and involvement among others.

But, we really don't need research to back us up as we have amazing young women such as Maydie O'Dea who represent all of the many ways the Girl Scouts lift up girls and young women. At this time we would like to share her Gold Award Video she produced.
