LET'S GO TO COLLEGE CALIFORNIA LAUNCHES VIRTUAL HUB PRIORITIZING SUPPORT & RESOURCES FOR COLLEGE STUDENTS DURING COVID-19

Student-Centered Campaign Addresses Equity, Collaboration and Advocacy for All Students Navigating College During the Global Pandemic

CALIFORNIA (Sept. 22, 2020) -- SoCal CAN, a network of nearly 100 organizations working to promote a college-going and completion culture in Southern California, today announced "Let's Go to College California (Let's Go)," a student-led virtual hub that prioritizes California student needs during COVID-19 and promotes resources to support them on their journey to pursue higher education.

Let's Go supports students based on their lived experiences, concerns and life aspirations. It provides timely resources in the areas of evolving campus plans, financial aid, distance learning, mental health needs, transfer options, campus climate, academic tips and meeting administrative deadlines so that students can make informed decisions about their college plans. It is a growing online community connected through social media and virtual programming that helps students engage and receive information. The Let's Go goals produce positive education outcomes for all students and include:

- Addressing equity in education
- Student-centered tools and systems
- Increased collaboration across higher education systems, elected officials and partner organizations for the benefit of students and their families
- Advocacy and increased student participation

"COVID-19 caused students, families, individuals and businesses to shift from what was normal and comfortable to a new way of learning, working and living," said Alison De Lucca, executive director, SoCal CAN. "While shifting was more fluid for some, we recognize that within the communities we serve, many students are feeling the gaps in equity widen as they try to move forward with navigating college. To better support them, we launched 'Let's Go' as a virtual hub that would reconnect students with likeminded students, supports and resources to inspire them to continue pursuing their dreams."

Let's Go provides information for students across all public higher education systems and focuses particularly on the needs of underrepresented students, including those from low-income families, firstgeneration college-goers, communities of color and undocumented immigrants.



"The effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on students have been complex, profound, and widespread," said Marcos Montes who leads the Let's Go to College CA work at SoCal CAN. "Millions of students in our state are working hard to achieve their college dreams, and they should be able to focus their efforts on their studies, work, and families—NOT on struggling to find the right information and resources necessary to access and continue their education."

Let's Go To College CA was launched with the generous support of the College Futures Foundation, The Kresge Foundation, and the California Community Foundation. We are grateful for their partnership in supporting students on their college journeys during these turbulent times. This fast-moving work is generating new opportunities to support students and the Let's Go to College CA efforts.
